<u>Bulk Lots</u>

Finding items to add to your collection from bulk lots can be an intersting past time although extremely time consuming. To get the best from lots the collector needs to have a broad philately mind and a clear understanding of quality as the collector with a keen eye will usually always find some items of interest. To aid recovery the collector should perhaps broaden their collecting interests.

 $\underline{Varieties}$ – It would be impossible to know all variations but knowledge of major items could perhaps help pay for that bulk lot and you would still retain key items from the lot.

<u>Postmarks & Dates</u> – This is another very interesting and popular field. Ist day of issue are always popular and some worth a hefty premium.(eg 1d red KGV 17/07/14 can be in the \$1000's)

<u>Shades</u> – This is quite a specialist area but knowledge of major shades can be rewarding particularly in the KGV and Kangaroos issues.

With carefull searching there are still major finds to be located in many areas. <u>Perfins</u> – Official and private perfins can be rare and well worth checking Remember <u>Knowledge is Power</u>

The Use of Postage Stamps to Teach Social Studies Topics

H ow wonderful it is when teachers motivate students with material so interesting, so enjoyable, and so beautiful that it stimulates a lifetime interest in many of them. Postage stamps are such teaching tools. With stamps, teachers can interest students in a topic and then use postage stamps for culminating activities and enrichment.

Almost all countries issue colorful and interesting postage stamps about a variety of subjects. Many issue stamps featuring particular themes, such as flowers, athletics, art, music, automobiles, or animals. In fact, stamps have been issued for almost any theme that a teacher might wish to explore. Stamps from different countries provide examples of different written languages and numerical notation, and they can be used in the study of such social studies topics as politics, history, geography, global/international education, cultural elements, technology, and peace education.

The most comprehensive source of stamp information is Scott's Standard

JOSEPH M. KIRMAN is a professor in the Department of Elementary Education at the University of Alberta in Edmonton. CHRIS JACKSON is the principal and a classroom teacher at the James Gibbons School in Elimonton, Alberta, Canada. Postage Stamp Catalogue, which contains reproductions of almost all the stamps issued worldwide and a list of their market value. The catalogue is published yearly and now fills six volumes. Other publications give information about specialized categories of stamps, such as the United Nations postage stamps issued between October 1957 and December 1961 (United Nations 1962), postal cartography (Klinefelter 1978), Canadian Indians (Canada Post 1976), medical history (Newerla 1964), and Canadian stamps of the second World War (Guertin 1970). Because new postage stamps are issued almost daily, any publication on stamps that deals with a topic is quickly outdated.

Postage Stamps as a Resource

Portraits of Political Figures

For a study of political history, teachers can show students postage stamps printed with portraits of leaders, national symbols, and flags. Students can study about the British Commonwealth of Nations by using stamps from Commonwealth countries that contain the portrait of Queen Elizabeth II. They can gauge the attitude toward the monarchy by seeing how many stamps depicting the Queen or the royal family have been issued in recent years.

By looking at older stamps, students can learn about history. Stamps issued to commemorate a particular historical event, such as Canadian Federation or the American Revolution (Skaggs and Wills 1977), can be resources for history students because such stamps provide an official government perspective on an event. What is included, excluded, or implied in the stamps provides a basis for inquiry and discussion of the topic.

Stamps that show cities, mountains, agriculture, animals, flowers, and industrial activities such as fishing, forestry, and mining help geography students. Some stamps depict maps (Ratanen 1991) that may have political implications. Geographic themes may show controversial borders that favor the country issuing the stamp, with disputed locations being shown to the advantage of the country of issue or its allies.

Teachers can enrich classes in global/international education with stamps from around the world and those from the United Nations. Some themes, such as the Olympics or the Boy Scouts, are often commemorated by many nations,
