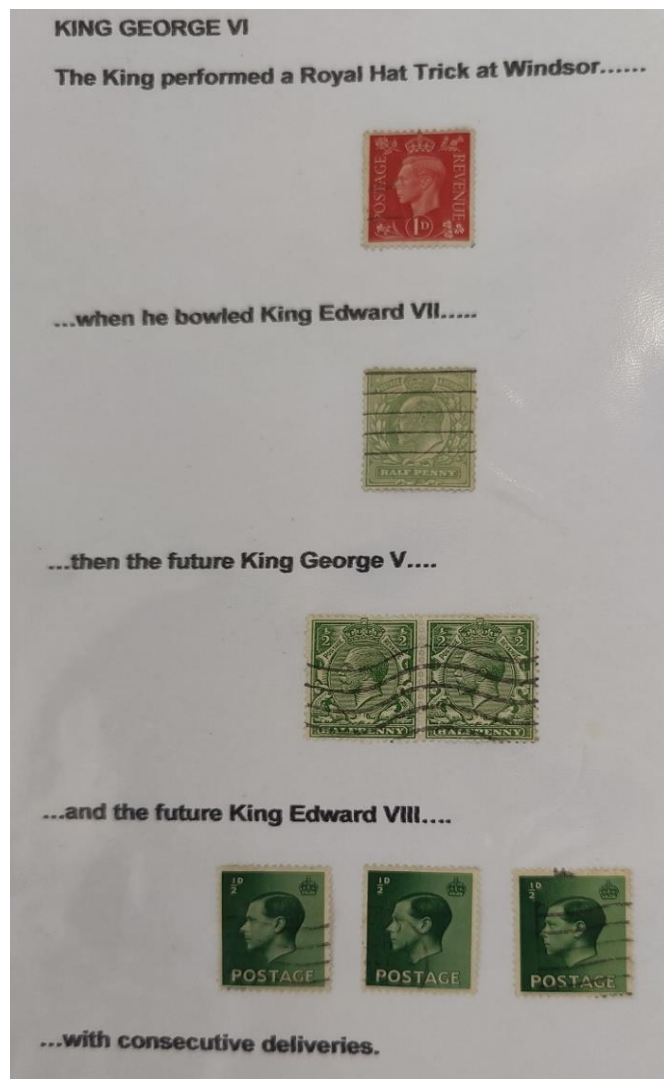

Daytime Stamp Club

At the March Daytime Stamp Club, Mr Ross Edwards displayed a stimulating collection of material on cricket's great players along with some of cricket's lesser-known curiosities.

The display included examples of philatelic products from non-cricketing nations that exploit cricket for no reason other than the raising of revenue. George W Bush "trying" cricket and Mickey Mouse, as the experienced cricketing mouse, were a couple of examples on display.

One of the most fascinating items, especially for those interested in Royalty related collecting, set out the bowling record of King George VI – not so much for the stamps as for the history. It is little known that King George VI performed the first and only Royal Hat-trick known to cricket:

King George VI was Patron of the Marylebone, Surrey and Lancashire cricket clubs.

As Prince Albert, before ascending the throne as King George VI, he performed the hat-trick on the private ground on the slopes below Windsor Castle, where the sons and grandsons of Edward VII played regularly.

The soon to be King and left-handed batsman and bowler, bowled King Edward VII, King George V and the then Duke of Windsor (subsequently King Edward VIII) in three consecutive balls, thus becoming the one and only Royal cricketer to perform the feat. Hence the Royal Hat-trick.

The ball that was his partner in the feat was retained and is now mounted and displayed in the mess-room of the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth.

A Hat-trick. What and why?

Heathfield Harmon Stephenson, a legendary Surrey roundarm seam bowler, is credited as being the creator of the cricketing hat-trick. In 1858, at the old Hyde Park ground, Sheffield, Stephenson

took three wickets in three balls playing for an All England XI against a twenty-two man local side, Hallam. Those in attendance were so moved by Stephenson's exploits that they undertook a quick whip around of the crowd which had observed the feat, put the collected booty in a hat and presented it to the bowler. The hat-trick was born. How much was raised is not recorded.

The March Daytime Stamp Club's "Show and Tell" also provided a number of items of interest to collectors of post-marks.

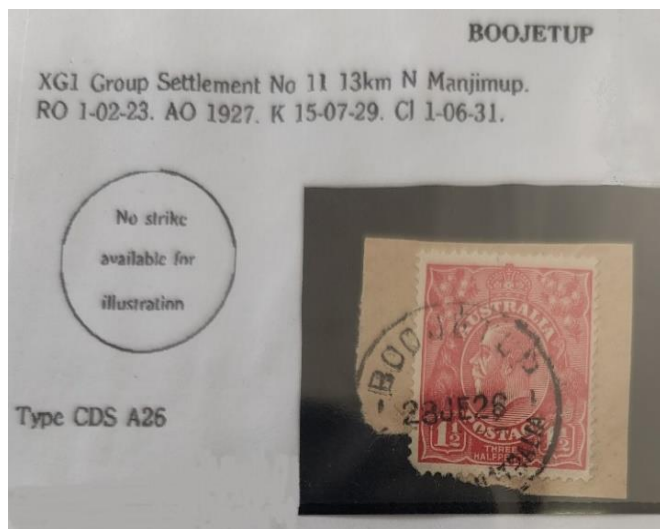
Mark Leaman displayed two, hard-to-find, Western Australian cancels he discovered recently when picking through a batch of loose material in his extensive accumulation.

The first was a very nice series of three 31 March 1927 Type CDS A30 Lower Chittering (11 km east of Muchea) strikes on a pair of George V 1½ d reds and a single, on paper:



These were recently sold for \$300. They may achieve a much higher price if put to auction.

The second, was a rare Boojetup Type CDS A26 strike, cancelled 28 June 1926:



Two of these Boojetup cancels have sold recently. One in Perth in March 2021 by Ace Auctions for \$235 plus fees, and another, in an Abacus Auction in September 2021 for \$500 plus fees. Both of those examples were off paper.

Finds such as these will, no doubt, provide encouragement for members to double-check post-mark material in their collections.

1d Red Kangaroo GL10 Cracked Electro - State 1 now Certified

Greg Morgan published a two-part article on The Cracked Cliches in the July and October 2022 Volumes of Stamp Hinges.

In Part 2 of that article he concluded that a State I of the GL10 cracked electro existed, and that he would be submitting his copies for verification.

Greg now advises that he has been issued a Certificate from Michael Drury, confirming the correctness of his research. Hence, it is now clearly established that a State 1 of GL10 exists with a crack breaking the coast near Albany and extending downwards for 4-5 shade lines.

PSWA's Philatelic Forum

Marcophily

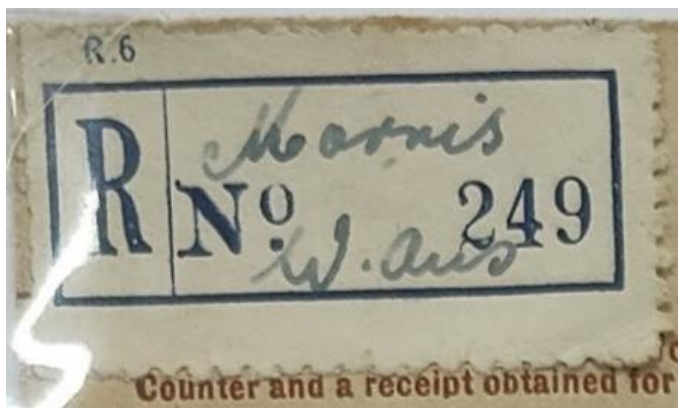
The PSWA's Philatelic Forum held on 6 March considered the developing area of Marcophily (Meter Marks).

Mr Trevor Spencer cut new ground with his five frame Western Australian Relief Postmarks display that he is developing, titled: "Relief Postmarks, Western Australia 1912 – 2013".

An enthusiastic and robust discussion centred around how to treat the subject, given the dearth of documented research currently available on related Western Australian material.

Relief postmarks are rare. Some were only used for one day until a replacement arrived, often from Melbourne, and the GPO did not hold the records of what went where, for very long.

While the Western Australian Study Group's "Postal Markings Illustrated" (PMI) is a good starting point, Trevor has had to resort to tracking down a number of retired postmasters who were employed during some of the period in which relief postmarks were in use, to obtain a fuller understanding of the how, why and frequency of use of the relief handstamps. Mysteries abound. For example, Morris:

Not so much a mystery, since it is known that this was the name given at one stage to the Eastern Goldfields Railway's re-ballasting camp which operated at Karalee from February 1949.

The engineer in charge, Mr Morris, also acted as the Postmaster and a mobile post office was named after him.

Apparently, Morris carried the name with him to where-ever he was stationed supervising the re-ballasting work on the rail tracks – so other examples probably exist for different locations.



Relief "D" Type A27

The handstamp was made from an obsolete CDS by erasing all but the letter "D" from the office named on the original. The mystery is: what was that original office that had all but the letter "D" erased from its handstamp? One possibility is that it was the siding of Bodallin, on the same line as Karalee. This was recorded as BODDALIN in the old railway maps. However, no strike is recorded.

The latter amendment was made to allow the Society to distribute its journal 'Stamp Hinges' more widely in order to better promote the hobby of stamp collecting.

The Fallibility of the Chatbots

There has been much anguish recently in academia and elsewhere about Artificial Intelligence (AI) and its Online cousin, the Chatbot, writing assignments for students, providing legal advice and its potential to generally displace human-based learned knowledge.

Is this anguish soundly based?

Here's an abridged example of a conversation I recently had with OpenAI's ChatGPT. I'll let you decide:

A somewhat amusing conversation.

It would seem that the ChatBots have a long way to go before they will be able to replace the human brain and the accumulation of knowledge.

ChatGPT currently appears to lack the ability to talk to itself and cross reference facts it holds and publishes.

For example, you'll note above that ChatGPT moved seamlessly from the error regarding its date (1913) for the issue of first Australian airmail stamp to the error (1914) without so much as a blush. When informed of the correct date (1929) ChatGPT accepted it as correct, without argument.

So, what do you do with an Artificial Intelligence application that is not very intelligent and is often untruthful in the "facts" it proffers? The answer to that question is probably: nothing.

It does write passable Haiku though:

Penny Black

*The Penny Black, so bold
First stamp, history unfolds
Queen's face, forever new.*

2023 Perth Stamp & Coin Show Attracts the Crowds



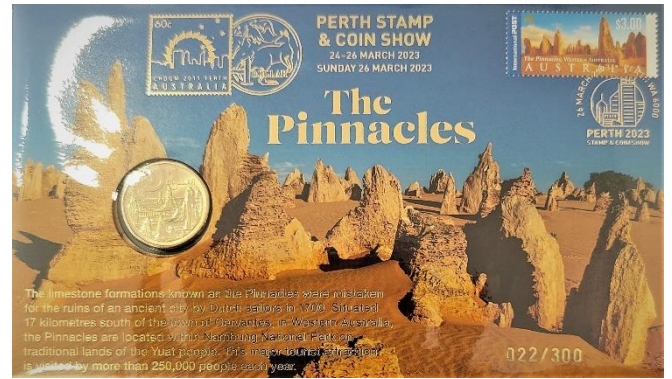
The first day of the 2023 Perth Stamp & Coin Show set a blistering pace for stamp and coin dealers, as well as collectors.

PSWA Swan River Stampshow including Swanpex 2023

There are a few spots still available in the catalogue, but it is filling quickly. So, if you intend to place material into the Stamp Mart auction, don't delay.

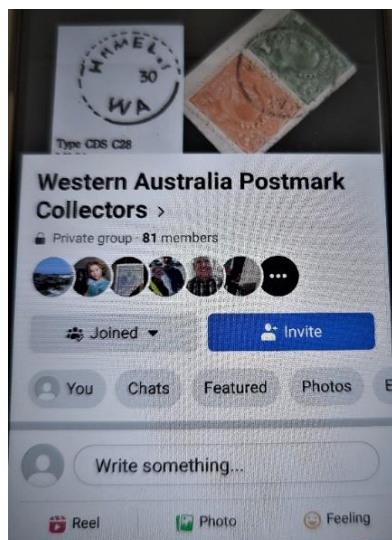
